-	1. Send to Rescue Flight Coordinator:
	<ul> <li>MOU form if not already filled out: https://dogcopilot.org/new-partner/</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Names and contact info (cell phone) for "day of" rescue/transport coordinators</li> </ul>
	Health Certificate for each animal prior to flight
	2. Crates:
	• Day before flight, size all animals to crates and ensure you have the correct sizes
	<ul> <li>Size appropriately so animal can stand up, turn around and lay down</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>No Wire Crates</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>After animals are loaded into crates, use Zip Ties to secure entire distance around the crate, including doors.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Nursing moms with babies, kennel mates or house mates can be in the same crate</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Animals must be able to comfortably stand up, lie down, and turn around.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Coordinator should bring extra, smaller sized crates in the chance of downsizing at the airport if needed</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Morning of flight: Count number of crates per receiving group and put on medical paperwork envelope</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Crate/size capacity examples: <a href="https://dogcopilot.org/wp-">https://dogcopilot.org/wp-</a></li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>No more than two dogs or cats, 8 weeks of age and older that are comparable size, may be transported in same</li> </ul>
	kennel.
	3. Labeling
	Crates must be Clearly labeled with ANIMAL NAME/ID, DESTINATION AIRPORT CODE, and DESTINATION Group
	Name (airport code found on flight itinerary)
	<ul> <li>Attach this information to a color-coded tag fastened to the front of the kennel</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Color code kennel tags per airport drop off (information will be provided to you)</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>No extra paperwork taped to kennel; must be provided in envelope handed to pilot</li> </ul>
	4. Schedule
	<ul> <li>Arrive ON-TIME and with your animals ready in crates! Refer to flight itinerary for time</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Receiving partners: make sure to have at least 2 volunteer/staff pick up animals</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Each airport will have their own regulations (i.e. transport to/from plane) so be familiar with them before the</li> </ul>
	flight departure and arrival. Discuss these procedures with Dog Is My CoPilot flight coordinator for further
	instructions
	5. Documentation
	Transported animals will be identified with a crate tag that will tie back to the animals' individual records.
	<ul> <li>Provide an envelope for destination group with health certs for each animal and any medical records; hand this</li> </ul>
	to Pilot
	<ul> <li>Put: receiving group name, corresponding airport code + number of crates per group on front of envelope</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Each animal transported is required to have a health certificate signed by a veterinarian; this must be sent via</li> </ul>
	email to Kara and Lynette the day before the flight.
	6. Feeding/water
	Air transport does not allow frequent stops for walking, feeding, or providing water.
	• All animals should be offered food and water within the 4 hours preceding the flight, this should be documented
	on the flight manifest.
	• For puppies or kittens under 16 weeks of age please provide canned wet food inside kennel or a small meal the
	morning of flight or as directed by veterinarian
